Our team's guiding principle will focus on building a more inclusive community with a priority on sharing information, resources, and experience amongst students. Research is our primary focus but graduate life is also a process of growth both personally and professionally, and we aim to present graduate students with more opportunities and resources so each student can become the best version of themselves.

Serving students from all populations means understanding the critical needs of everyone. We will work actively with student groups to support in planning and funding cultural exchange and social events. We would like to help by providing more permanent support to exceptional events that meet the goals of the graduate school in helping to create more culturally well-rounded graduates. Work with diverse student groups and organizations like ISSA (International Student and Scholar Affairs) to host more social events where both international and domestic students can connect with their peers from their home or country so that new students can better understand the cultural differences between the US and their home country and learn how to overcome them from their seniors. This will help both international and domestic students settle easily into their graduate life.

Our administration firmly believes that graduate school does not have to be lonely! We plan to advocate for novel Grad student mental health initiatives aggressively. We will partner with McWell and lobby the administration for more intentional mental health programming and policies for graduate students. We would like to come up with 'instituted student companionship'.

1. Ease the financial burden on students so they can focus more on their research and enjoy a better quality of life. To that end, we are advocating for
 - Reduced parking rates for graduate students (currently it is 260 USD per 21 semester).
 - Access to at least one meal in the dining hall at the staff rate for graduate students.
 - Access to a premium subscription for homework for all graduate students. Research can be hectic and Duncan Gym works at full capacity with undergrads. Grad students should be able to avail some facilities to help them work out at their convenience.
 - Dental health care is a necessity for graduate students and should be included in the healthcare benefits already offered by the University.

2. Encourage the administration to set up
 - More campus-based graduate student spaces (we only have Duncan Lounge and Hesburgh space for now). The graduate student lounge at Duncan needs to be expanded and set up with basic amenities like coffee or soft drinks). A dedicated space where students of all faiths can come to pray, share, and experience diversity.
 - Small gym and community room with 24-hour access in The Landings.
3. Implement 'institute student companionship'- a kind of mentoring program for new students where they will be assigned and guided by a mentor from preferably the same department, who can share their advice and experience on both academic and social matters. Students come to grad school from diverse backgrounds and each of them faces challenges, which will hopefully become a bit easier to cope with and settle if someone with experience and more information about resources can team up with them and help them in the beginning couple of months.
4. A lot of students have pets here and they are excellent companions (a big mental and emotional support) but it becomes an issue when students have to travel or avail veterinary care when their pets get sick. To that end, we hope to build a community of like-minded people who can get to know each other and their pets and take care of the pets when students travel.
5. Work with ISSA to host more social events where international students can connect with their peers from their home country so that new students can better understand the cultural differences between the US and their home country and learn how to overcome them from their seniors. This will help international students settle easily into their grad life.
